Red Snapper Frustration Continues in the South Atlantic

NOAA Fisheries announced a limited Red Snapper season for the South Atlantic. With a biomass of Red Snapper that is estimated to be the largest that anyone alive has ever seen, NOAA announces an abysmal two day season for recreational anglers and a one fish per person bag limit. Frustration is boiling over with anglers as they try to be better stewards of the sea by working to lower dead discards using descending devices and the Federal Fisheries managers are working against them by only allowing for a two day season. We need to come together and improve the mismanagement of this fishery and allow more access to the South Atlantic red snapper fishery.

The announcement of the 48-hour season leaves anglers frustrated, yet again with an inflexible federal fisheries management system that many see as punitive rather than constructive. #CCAFlorida has been collaborating with CCA national and its counterpart, The Center for Sportfishing Policy to resolve this issue.

"We are clearly at a dead-end with federal management of this fishery. If this is the best the agency can do – and we have been told that under current law that is the case – then the South Atlantic states need to re-evaluate how we are managing our marine resources," said Bill Bird, chairman of CCA National's Government Relations Committee. "This is rock bottom for the management system when you have the healthiest population in recent history combined with a 48-hour season."

Frustrated anglers say the red snapper is the easiest-caught fish in the Atlantic Ocean, and it is nearly impos-

sible to get bait past these voracious feeders to reach deeper reef fish species. Over the last decade, anglers have been baffled by NOAA Fisheries' decision to radically limit public access to red snapper despite the plentiful number of fish they are encountering on the water. In the last 12 years, the recreational sector has been allowed to harvest red snapper in South Atlantic federal waters a cumulative total of 44 days despite increasing abundance of fish.

"The two-day South Atlantic recreational red snapper season is a prime example of the absolute failure by NOAA Fisheries to collect sound data on recreational fisheries and apply adaptive management to a stock that is rebuilding faster than anticipated. While the South Atlantic Council and Congress are working to obtain better data, we are years away from those efforts bearing fruit," said Jeff Angers, president of the Center for Sportfishing Policy. "Recreational anglers are doing their part to reduce discard mortality and participate in the management process. It's beyond time for the federal government to do its part to facilitate better data for more informed management decisions."

"Saltwater anglers annually spend more than \$7.8 billion on fishing trips and durable goods in the South Atlantic," Angers continued. "Experts believe current abundance of South Atlantic red snapper is the highest it has been since the 1960s. Yet anglers are caught in a vicious cycle of a management regime based on guesses that is penalizing the success of this rebuilding stock."






Winners will receive an \$80,000 prize package for catching Tagged Redfish in the 2022 West Marine CCA Florida STAR competition presented by Yamaha.

Additionally, STAR's other tagged division, the Tigress Outriggers and Gear Tagged Dolphin Division, will award \$10,000 to the first registrant who catches a tagged dolphin.

"This year's competition is proving to be our largest one yet and we could not be more excited," CCA Florida STAR Director Leiza Fitzgerald said. "STAR is about having fun, winning awesome prizes and, most importantly, giving opportunities to fish smarter with our catch-photo-release competition."

Unlike traditional fishing competitions, CCA Florida STAR focuses on conservation and offers \$500,000 in prizes and scholarships during the 101-day event. Recognized as a "catch, photo and release" competition, STAR's smart

phone app eliminates the requirement for anglers to harvest or capture and transport fish.

STAR is also focused on youth participation, with its Youth Scholarship Division presented by Realtree Fishing, offering \$100,000 in scholarships. Youth anglers (ages 6-17) can register for free with a current CCA Florida youth membership (\$10) and are eligible for prizes in both tagged divisions.

Snapper Cakes With Spicy Remoulade Sauce

Ingredients

SPICY REMOULADE SAUCE

- 35 c mayonnaise
- 1/2 c sour cream
- tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tbsp honey
- 1 tbsp horseradish
- 1 thsp Dijon mustard
- 2 tsp Louisiana hot sauce
- 1 tsp Cajun seasoning

Juice of 1 lemon

SNAPPER CAKES

Vegetable oil for frying

- % c fresh corn kernels
- ¼ c red bell pepper, finely diced
- ½ c yellow onion, finely diced
- 1 clove fresh garlic, minced
- 2 large snapper fillets, cut into small pieces
- 1/2 c mayonnaise
- 14 c green onion, thinly sliced
- 1 thsp Dijon mustard
- 1/2 tsp kosher salt
- ¼ tsp black pepper
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 c panko bread crumbs

Directions

Make the remoulade sauce by whisking all ingredients thoroughly in a small bowl. Let sit in refrigerator for at least 30 minutes. The longer it sits, the better, even as long as overnight.

In a large skillet, heat 1 tablespoon oil over medium heat. Add corn, bell pepper, yellow onion and garlic; cook until all vegetables are softened, about 5 minutes. Add all the snapper pieces to the skillet and cook about 5 minutes per side or until fish is cooked through. Transfer the fish and vegetable mixture into a large bowl and let cool for 10 minutes. Add mayonnaise, green onion, mustard, salt, pepper, egg and panko bread crumbs. Gently fold it all together until well combined, taking care not to break up the fish too much. Refrigerate for 10 minutes then shape mixture into ½ cup patties.

Heat about 4 tablespoons vegetable oil in the same skillet over medium-high heat. Once oil is hot enough for frying, cook cakes in batches until golden brown, about 3 minutes per side. Let drain on paper towels or a wire rack. Repeat process until all fish cakes are browned.

To serve, place one or two snapper cakes on a plate, top with remoulade sauce and garnish with extra chopped green onion and lemon wedges. MAKES ABOUT 8 CAKES.



In honor of Earth Day, CCA Florida joined Star brite to host its inaugural "Clean Water Collective," a three-day event promoting habitat restoration in the Indian River Lagoon (IRL).

For decades, the IRL's deteriorating wa-

ter quality has caused its marine habitat to suffer. To counteract these effects, CCA Florida and Star brite, in partnership with Capt. Blair Wiggins from the Indian River Lagoon Clam Restoration Project (IRL-CRP) and the University of Florida Whitney Lab, took proactive approach to habitat restoration by planting 100,000 clams in the Banana River.

clean Water Collective is an opportunity to enhance one of Florida's most diverse marine estuaries," CCA Florida Executive Director Brian Gorski said. "We are excited to team up with Star brite and launch this awesome Earth Day event – it's projects like these that bring us one step closer to restoring the IRL."

Clams are filter feeders, removing excess nutrients from inshore coastal waters, as a result, creating clearer water. Improved water clarity allows more sunlight to penetrate the ecosystem and supports the growth of essential seagrasses, a vital need for the IRL.

"We are very excited to jump in the water and tackle the devastating water-quality issues effecting many of Florida's waterways," Star brite Executive Vice President Greg Dornau said. "Our SeaSafe initiative is not just about putting a label on a bottle to show our environmental commitment, but taking part in a hands-on solution for the IRL."

Clean Water Collective volunteers also planted mangroves, attended education workshops focused on marine conservation and participated in a coastal cleanup.

CCA Florida and partners joined effort to create new oyster reef in Turtle Bay

On May 26, Coastal Conservation Association Florida partnered with Ingman Marine, Abbott Construction, Lee Reefs, Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation (SCCF), Capt. Jay Withers, Placida Point LLC, Clermont Oyster Bar and Lake County Solid Waste Division to deploy two dump truck loads of oyster shells in Charlotte Harbor's Turtle Bay in effort to boost water quality, marine fisheries and recreational angling.

The oysters were hauled from CCA Florida's Oyster Recycling Program at the Lake County Landfill in Astatula and transported to Placida. The oysters were then loaded onto a barge, provided by Abbott

Construction, and deployed in Turtle Bay at a pre-permitted location.

"Deploying dried oyster shells to create a new oyster reef is a testament to our commitment of protecting and enhancing Florida's marine habitat, and we couldn't do it without the help from our amazing community partners and members," CCA Florida Chief Operating Officer Adam Miller said. "With all the water quality issues in Charlotte Harbor, it is imperative to do whatever we can to help restore the water quality, habitat and marine life."

The recycled oyster shells, donated by the Clermont Oyster Bar, are first dried for six months to kill any potential pathogens. Once deployed, will eventually attract new oyster larvae, and over time will form a new oyster reef.


"With an estimated 85% loss of oyster reefs worldwide, efforts for restoration must be made a priority all around the state," CCA Florida's Director of Habitat and Environmental Restoration Frank Gidus said. "It is critical to come together and pool our resources in effort to tackle larger areas in need of restoration."

The federal pre-permitted location allows for more material to be deployed at this Turtle Bay site. Oyster reefs filter pollutants, reduce turbidity and create habitat for a variety of marine species.

- Funds from the sale of this license plate support protecting and enhancing saltwater marine resources, expanding habitat restoration efforts and promoting coastal environmental education





Ingredients

Extra virgin olive oil

Salt and pepper

- 9 mini red, orange and yellow sweet peppers, seeded and sliced (3 of each color)
- 3 jalapeño, seeded and sliced
- 1 12 oz can evaporated milk
- 12 oz package quesadilla melting cheese
- 4 oz cream cheese
- 1 tsp Cajun seasoning
- clove garlic, grated
- 1 c green onion, thinly sliced
- 12 oz fresh lump crab meat
- 2 bags thick tortilla chips
- c shredded Monterey jack cheese

Garnish: lime wedges, cubed avocado, sliced green onion

Directions

Preheat oven to 425°F.

Arrange sweet peppers and jalapeño on a large baking sheet, drizzle with the olive oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Bake for about 10 minutes to soften. Remove from oven and set aside for assembly. Leave oven on for cooking nachos.

In a medium saucepan, heat evaporated milk until hot, but not boiling. Slowly add in cheeses, Cajun seasoning and garlic, and whisk continuously until smooth. Once all ingredients are thoroughly combined, gently stir in crab and green onions. Remove from heat and set aside.

Distribute a layer of chips on a 14"x19" sheet pan, greased and lined with parchment paper. Spoon desired amount of the crab mixture over the chips then top with another layer of chips. Spoon over more of the crab mixture, then top with the shredded Monterey jack cheese. NOTE: you will have enough crab mixture to make two full 14"x19" sheet pans full of nachos.

Bake in the preheated oven for 15 to 20 minutes or until the cheese is melted.

Remove from oven and top with roasted peppers, avocados and green onion. Serve immediately with lime wedges. SERVES A CROWD.
